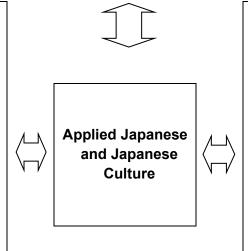

The course is built upon the foundation knowledge students acquired in, e.g.

- Chinese Language Education and English Language Education communication skills
- **Technology Education** information technology skills
- Personal, Social and Humanities Education foundations and characteristics of culture

8. Learning and Teaching

In this course, student-centred learning and teaching activities are designed to enable students to understand fundamental theories and concepts, develop their generic skills, and address their career aspirations in various field (e.g. purchasing/liaison office, tourism, translation).

Different modes of activities are employed to provide students with a systematic understanding about the context (e.g. lectures and games on language skills in social and work contexts) and eye-opening opportunities to experience the complexity of the context (e.g. visits to Japanese business and cultural organisations, and seminars by practitioners).

Students acquire an understanding of the requirements, fundamental knowledge and skills essential for further learning within the area through learning-by-practising opportunities in an authentic or near-authentic environment (e.g. participate in activities promoting Japanese business or culture).

Students are given opportunities to consolidate their learning and demonstrate entrepreneurship and innovation (e.g. in the Japanese business culture activities, students integrate their knowledge and skills acquired to prepare for a simulated job application process).

9. Curriculum Pillars of Applied Learning

Through related contexts, students have different learning opportunities, for example:

(i) Career-related Competencies

- communicate orally in Japanese language in daily life and work contexts;
- comprehend and write documents and information in Japanese language in daily life and work contexts; and
- demonstrate an understanding of Japanese society and business culture.

(ii) Foundation Skills

- demonstrate effective communication skills through role-play, group discussion, presentation and report writing; and
- apply information technology skills in delivering multimedia presentation.

(iii) Thinking Skills

- apply analytical skills to understand the ancient Japanese culture and developments of modern Japan;
- understand how historical influences affect current developments in Japanese culture; and
- apply problem-solving and creative thinking skills to tackle problems in social and work contexts.

(iv) People Skills

- demonstrate interpersonal and collaborative skills through interaction with fellow students in different contexts;
- respect differences in cultures and backgrounds; and
- apply concepts of group dynamics to enhance interpersonal skills and teamwork.

(v) Values and Attitudes

- respect intellectual property rights in the process of research; and
- develop self-confidence and a sense of responsibility in language learning.
