① Relative clause & appositive

To provide additional information about the participants

(1) Relative clause

e.g. "It's very palatable!" Benjamin Lee from S4A, who had just devoured a vegan drumstick, exclaimed.

(2) Appositive

e.g. His classmate Lucy Cheung, also the chairperson of Green Club, was impressed by the BYOU (Bring Your Own Utensils) arrangement as much as the "green foods".

② Direct quote

To capture the tones and attitudes of the participants and create a sense of spontaneity

e.g. Asked whether she would continue to say no to disposable utensils, she answered without hesitation, "I've already got a set of reusable plate and cutlery with me. Why will I not?"

③ Reported speech

To summarise the participants' views and suggestions objectively using different reporting verbs (e.g. "expressed", "opined", "suggested", "believed")

e.g. Benjamin agreed with Lucy and suggested that the school hosts similar events like the Stop Food Waste Day to raise consciousness.
