Visual words allow readers to see more clearly what is described. These words can be further categorised into groups based on size, shape, colour, etc.

Lighting: Colour: Shape: Size: shimmering dark blue bulky oval glowing gigantic light grey curved sparkling bright red enormous shady pointed pastel green tiny

e.g. We sailed across the vast and furious ocean, pushing through the shimmering waves.

Sensory Janguage

Sensory words add *sparkles and sprinkles* to your writing as they make your readers see, hear, smell, taste, or feel your words!

SOUND

Auditory words allow readers to hear what is happening.

humming moaning groaning rumbling scratching roaring deafening cracking

whispering murmuring screeching screaming

The little girl in the playground started humming a light-hearted melody in delight.

TASIII

Gustatory words turn the content flavoursome.

sugaryspicygreasysavourypungentblandbittertangymintytartmellowjuicy

The salty-sweet caramel melted on the baby's tongue. The surprising sugariness made her smile.

SMITI

Olfactory words allow readers to smell the aroma.

fragrant pleasant musty
perfumed refreshing stale
sweet-scented tempting rancid
fruity tantalising revolting

Spring comes as the sweet-scented blossoms fill the air with their refreshing fragrance.

TOUCH

Tactile words let readers feel the texture and temperature.

fluffy rocky spongy
silky soggy coarse
prickly gluey scorching
spiky foamy icy

e.g. I love summer. The warm sun kisses my face and fluffy and wispy clouds float across the sky.
