

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
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
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Learning and Teaching Resources on Writing and Delivering a Motivational Speech at the Primary Level

"Promoting Positive Values and Attitudes through English Sayings of Wisdom (SOW)" is a territory-wide and cross-curricular initiative that connects English Language education with values education. Building on the success in the past years, the SOW Campaign will continue to feature a variety of student activities to enrich students' English learning experiences and nurture positive values and attitudes in them. In this connection, two sets of learning and teaching materials are developed to guide students to write and deliver a motivational speech and support the learning of an overarching theme, i.e. "Leading a Positive Life", and four sub-themes, i.e. "Cherishing Life", "Empathy", "Diligence" and "Respect for Diversity".

Aims

The captioned learning and teaching resources aim to support English Language teachers in

- promoting positive values and attitudes through guiding students to share their reading/viewing experience by connecting their reflections on a reading/multimodal text (e.g. a book, a short story, a poem, a film) with a SOW that echoes the abovementioned theme(s);
- enhancing students' interest in reading/viewing and developing their language skills;
 and
- nurturing students' creativity and developing their multimodal literacy through processing and/or creating multimodal texts.

Content

Each set of the learning and teaching materials comprises a reading/multimodal text about a famous and fantastic person and suggested reading/viewing, writing and speaking activities with teaching steps to develop students' language skills, nurture their creativity and cultivate positive values and attitudes. The speech writing and performance task provides opportunities for students to connect their reflections on a reading/multimodal text of their own choice with a SOW that echoes the above-mentioned themes.

To enrich students' knowledge of SOW and promote self-directed learning, a list of selected SOW under the sub-themes "Cherishing Life", "Empathy", "Diligence" and "Respect for Diversity" is provided in the appendix of each set of the materials.

<u>Learning Task 1 – The Story of Hua Mulan (KS1/KS2)</u>

Students learn the SOW "We rise by lifting others." and understand the positive values and attitudes behind (e.g. empathy) through reading "The Story of Hua Mulan". In the writing part, students are guided to complete a motivational speech by connecting their reflections on the story with the SOW. Then, they read/view a reading/multimodal text of their own choice and connect their reflections with a SOW that echoes the above-mentioned theme and/or subtheme(s). Features of a motivational speech, useful expressions and language to present ideas are provided to support students in writing their speech.

<u>Learning Task 2 – An Interview with Ms Yu Chui Yee Alison (KS2)</u>

Students learn the SOW "A bend in the road is not the end of the road." and understand the positive values and attitudes behind (e.g. cherishing life) through viewing "An Interview with

Ms Yu Chui Yee Alison" in the series of "Fantastic People Videos" (https://emm.edcity.hk/playlist/1 hea30nj2/1 gjbkgroh). In the writing part, scaffolding is provided through exposing students to a sample speech to help them understand the key features of a speech. Graphic organisers are provided to support students to write their motivational speech, in which they



they make reflections on a reading/multimodal text of their own choice, write about their reading/viewing experience, and connect it with a SOW that echoes the above-mentioned theme and/or sub-theme(s).

The speaking task in both Learning Tasks 1 and 2 provides students with an opportunity to present their motivational speech to peers. Students are also encouraged to refer to the tips for practising the motivational speech and the assessment criteria to improve their speech, as well as their presentation and communication skills.

How can the resources be used?

The resources consist of learning tasks and teaching ideas for teachers' reference on how to promote positive values and attitudes among students with SOW in the primary English classroom. Teachers might like to select and use the learning materials and teaching ideas or make adaptations to suit their students' needs, interests and abilities.

Learning Task 1 The Story of Hua Mulan

Theme

Leading a Positive Life - Empathy

Suggested Key Stage

KS1 and KS2

Task Description

Students read "The Story of Hua Mulan". Teachers guide students to understand the story, analyse the main character, Mulan, discuss the moral of the story, and connect their reflections on Mulan's story with a saying of wisdom (SOW). Then, students learn the key elements of a motivational speech and write about their reading or viewing experience by connecting their reflections on a text of their own choice and a SOW that echoes the overarching theme, i.e. "Leading a Positive Life", and/or the sub-themes "Cherishing Life", "Diligence", "Empathy" and "Respect for Diversity". After that, teachers guide students to share their reading or viewing experience verbally by introducing presentation skills and assessment criteria to them.

Learning Objectives

Content

- To understand the content of "The Story of Hua Mulan"
- To analyse the main character, Mulan
- To connect a related SOW with Mulan's story
- To develop positive values and attitudes

Language

- To practise reading skills (e.g. skimming, scanning, identifying specific information, understanding the connection between ideas)
- To explore adjectives to describe characters' personality and feelings
- To introduce the features and language used in a motivational speech
- To practise speaking skills (e.g. speaking fluently and naturally with correct pronunciation)

Suggested Learning Activities

Pre-reading

- 1. Brainstorm with students how they help others in their daily lives.
 - When your family, friends or classmates have difficulties, how would you help them? Why would you want to help?
 - Have you ever heard of "The Story of Hua Mulan"? What is it about?
- 2. Have students predict the challenges faced by Mulan and her feelings.
 - Would Mulan help her family?
 - What would she do to solve the problem? How did she feel?
- Pre-teach the vocabulary to help students understand the reading text and guide them to complete Worksheet 1.

While-reading

- 1. Introduce adjectives to describe Mulan's feelings, explain more adjectives of feelings to enrich students' vocabulary and have them complete Part 1 of Worksheet 2.
- 2. Guide students to skim and scan the story by asking questions and have them complete the multiple-choice questions in Part 2 of Worksheet 2.

Post-reading and Values Education

- 1. Have students describe Mulan's personality with suitable adjectives and guide them to complete Part 1 of Worksheet 3 based on the clues in the speech bubbles.
- 2. Introduce the meaning of "Sayings of Wisdom (SOW)" and four selected SOW in Part 2a of Worksheet 3 to students.
- 3. Engage students in discussing the ending and the moral of the story.
- 4. Have students work in groups and choose one of the SOW which best describes Mulan (e.g. "We rise by lifting others.").
- 5. Guide students to elaborate their ideas with the guiding questions in Part 2b of Worksheet 3 and complete the part together.

Sayings of Wisdom (SOW) Motivational Talk – Writing and Delivering a Motivational Speech

- 1. Provide a context for students to write a motivational speech in Part 1 of Worksheet 4.
- 2. Introduce the overarching theme and sub-themes of the SOW Motivational Contest to students (Part 1 of Worksheet 4).
- 3. Encourage students to find more SOW online and have them complete Part 2 of Worksheet 4.
- 4. Introduce the features and language used in a motivational speech and have students complete Part 3 of Worksheet 4.
- 5. Guide students to write a motivational speech based on a reading/multimodal text of their own choice in Part 4 of Worksheet 4.
- 6. Introduce presentation skills and assessment criteria to students in Part 5 of Worksheet 4.
- 7. Have students record and share their reading/viewing experience in class.
- 8. Guide students to conduct self-assessment by referring to the assessment checklist.

Learning Task 2 An Interview with Ms Yu Chui Yee Alison

Theme

Leading a Positive Life - Cherishing life

Suggested Key Stage

Task Description

Students view an interview about Ms Yu Chui Yee, Alison and learn more about her challenges and achievements. Teachers guide students to understand Alison's life motto and positive attitudes and connect their reflections on Alison's story with a saying of wisdom (SOW). Then, students learn the key elements of a motivational speech and write about their reading or viewing experience by connecting their reflections on a text of their own choice and a SOW that echoes the overarching theme, i.e. "Leading a Positive Life", and/or the sub-themes "Cherishing Life", "Diligence", "Empathy" and "Respect for Diversity". After that, teachers guide students to share their reading or viewing experience verbally by introducing presentation skills and assessment criteria to them.

Learning Objectives

Content

- To understand the success story of Alison Yu
- To connect a related SOW with Alison's experience
- To develop positive values and attitudes

Language

- To practise viewing skills (e.g. making predictions about the challenges Alison faced, identifying the sequence of events)
- To introduce the key elements of a speech
- To practise speaking skills (e.g. speaking with appropriate intonation, stress and pauses)

Suggested Learning Activities

Pre-viewing

1. Introduce the success story of a Paralympic athlete, Ms Yu Chui Yee, Alison. Ask students to imagine that they are going to interview her and prepare some questions for the interview. Guide them to complete Worksheet 1.

While-viewing

- 1. Watch the interview and complete a timeline to summarise the interview with Alison in Part 1 of Worksheet 2.
- 2. Have students complete the multiple-choice questions in Part 2 of Worksheet 2 to check their understanding of the video.

Post-viewing and Values Education

- 1. Engage students in discussing the personality of Alison, encourage them to present their ideas with suitable adjectives and elaborate their ideas with clues from the interview and complete Part 1 of Worksheet 3.
- 2. Introduce the meaning of "Sayings of Wisdom (SOW)" and four selected SOW in Part 2a of Worksheet 3 to students. Have students work in groups, choose one of the SOW to describe Alison and refer to the interview transcript to find more clues. Guiding questions are provided to support students to elaborate their ideas.
- 3. Have students complete Part 2b of Worksheet 3.
