# Title: The Boat Trip

### Key stage targets:

Interpersonal Strand/Dimension (ID)

- To establish and maintain relationships and routines in school and other familiar situations (IDa)
- To converse about feelings, ideas, experiences and plans (IDb)
- To participate with others in making choices and decisions for carrying out events (IDd)

# Language focus:

- Use adverbs to describe manner *e.g. I just want to watch the dragon boat race and cheer very <u>loudly</u>.*
- Use pronouns to refer to people, events, objects and time in a general/indefinite way
   e.g. I don't want to do <u>anything</u> like that!

• Use formulaic expressions to make and respond to suggestions *e.g. Let's go on a boat trip to Sai Kung./Yeah, that's a great idea.* 

### Synopsis:

Pat, Nick, Alice and John are classmates. When they are doing their English homework, they see a picture of a dragon boat and get excited about watching a dragon boat race. Since it is near Dragon Boat Festival, they decide to go on a boat trip where they might see some teams practising. During their boat trip, they go to the front of the boat. John falls into the water. A dragon boat team rescues him. They all end up going for a ride in a dragon boat.

## Key movements:

- a. Pointing excitedly at a picture
- b. Fishing
- c. Paddling a boat
- d. Beating a drum
- e. Losing balance and falling into the water
- f. Waving arms and calling for help
- g. Cheering someone on

### **Key dialogues:**

a. Dialogues which convey the meaning of the play to the audience e.g. **Nick, Pat and Alice:** Yes, thank you for saving our friend.

**Dragon Boat Team Leader:** Not at all. Remember to be more careful next time.

John: I will.

This dialogue conveys the most important lesson in the play: children can have fun but they must be very careful especially when they are playing in the water.

b. Dialogues which convey the nature of the characters

e.g. **John:** (Standing on the guardrail of the boat pretending to beat a drum) Yeah! Look at me beating the drum. I'm so good at this.

Pat and Alice:John! Be careful! Come down from there. You'll<br/>fall!

This dialogue shows that John gets excited very easily and that he is not careful.

c. Dialogues which include the language focus
e.g. Nick, Pat and Alice: John! Hurry up! You're late!
John: OK, OK! Just a minute! I think I've got a big one!
Nick: John! Just hurry up! You've never caught a big one! We've got to plan our boat trip immediately. Come over here now!

This dialogue helps pupils to practise using adverbs to describe manner.
