LPF Reading Exemplar

For a Five-year-old

Task Description

Students read the poem "For a Five-year-old", which is about the influence of a mother on her child. They then responded to questions related to the poem.

Preparation

Before the reading activity, students discussed the following questions:

- What words can be put after the preposition "for"? What kind of words are they?
- With reference to the title of the poem, who does "a Five-year-old" refer to?
- Who could have written this poem? What could it be about?

3.	Why does the poet present the two sides of the mother? (Accept any reasonable answers.) No matter what kind of person the mother is, as a mother, it is important to convey the right message to the child. 4.	By using the word "moulded", what does the poet want to say about the child's 'gentleness'? Fill in the blank with ONE word. (Accept any reasonable answers.) The child's gentleness can be <u>developed</u> .	 ATM 7 work out the meaning of the figurative use of the word "moulded" by using syntactic clues, e.g. the passive construction indicates that 'words' can influence a child's gentleness and that the influence occurs over a period of time semantic clues, e.g. the word 'moulded' comes from the noun "mould", which means a hollow container used for shaping purposes
5.	In your own words, explain what this poem might say about the job of bringing up children? (Accept any reasonable answers.) It should be taken very seriously as it is parents' responsibility to teach their child the right things and to mould them.	
6.	What possibly explain the reason for the use of the pronoun 'we' in Line 5 and the last line of the poem? (Accept any reasonable answers.) The mother acts as a role model for the child to follow and they are doing the same things.	 ATM 7 understand the use of the pronoun 'we' in the poem to show the close relationship between the mother and the child

For a Five-year-old Fleur Adcock

A snail is climbing up the window-sill					
Into your room, after a night of rain.					
You call me in to see, and I explain					
That it would be unkind to leave it there:					
It might crawl to the floor; we must take care					
That no one squashes it. You understand,					
And carry it outside, with careful hand,					
To eat a daffodil.					

I see, then, that a kind of faith prevails: Your gentleness is moulded still by words 10 From me, who have trapped mice and shot wild birds, From me, who drowned your kittens, who betrayed Your closest relatives, and who purveyed¹ The hardest kind of truth to many another, But that is how things are: I am your mother 15 And we are kind to snails.
