









Guiding Principles of Life-wide Learning

Grant

Listed below are examples on the use of the Grant that are not in line with the principles:

- Organising activities that are not aligned with goals and objectives, circulars, instructions or guidelines issued by the EDB.
- Employing teaching or non-teaching staff
- Outsourcing to outside parties the overall planning
- Subsidising students' participation in activities that are primarily focused on academic performance or assessment
- Subsidising teachers' participation in training courses
- Subsidising seminars or activities for parents
- Meeting the costs of renovation/works done on the school building.
- Purchasing equipment or tools for handling clerical work of the school.
- Purchasing mobile computing devices, electronic equipment, computer software, etc. for general purposes.
- Meeting banquet- or courtesy-related expenses.
- Meeting the expenses on promotional and publicity activities, social events or celebrations (e.g. graduation dinners, parties).
- Meeting the expenses for food and beverages (as an exception, meal expenses included in the expenditures in educational / training camps, and non-local exchange activities can be covered).
